Report of the President-Elect

Greetings from Arkansas!

I hope the spring semester is going smoothly for everyone.

As the spring semester is almost half over, with summer fast approaching, it is time to once again think ABSTRACTS for the 2006 Annual meeting of the Central States Chapter (CSC) of the American College of Sports Medicine (ACSM). I strongly encourage both faculty, but especially students to submit abstracts. There is additional time set aside this year for numerous student presentations. Through the abstract review process the top projects will be afforded the opportunity to present orally. This is a great experience as it prepares one for national presentations as students, and eventually as faculty. Besides gaining valuable experience, there is a \$500 monetary award given to both the top doctoral level and master/undergraduate level project, with the stipulation the funds are used to attend and present at the National ACSM meeting.

Abstracts must be submitted electronically by September 11th, 2006. Abstracts received after this time will not be reviewed. Each individual is allowed to be first author on only one abstract, but may co-author several other abstracts. The first author must present the abstract at the annual meeting and at least one of the authors must be a member of the CSC ACSM. All abstracts will undergo a blind review by four professional members. Those that are accepted will be published in the conference program.

For detailed submission information please refer to the CSC ACSM home page at www.centralstatesacsm.org for the link to the Abstract Submission. The link will provide the submission guidelines and an application form where first author information must be filled in. Upon confirming the author information is correct, upload the abstract. Please make sure the abstract meets all the requirements stated in the submission guidelines. An example of an acceptable abstract is on the CSC ACSM website. Briefly, each abstract must

be informative, including a statement of the study's PURPOSE, METHODS, summary of RESULTS, and CONCLUSION. CSC is following the guidelines established for writing abstracts submitted to the national ACSM meeting.

Oral presentations will be on Thursday afternoon from 4:00-5:30 p.m., October 19th, 2006 and will include the winners for "outstanding research projects" (details in following paragraph). Other abstracts will be presented in a poster format during the social later on Thursday afternoon. Presenters will be expected to stand by their poster from 5:30-6:30 p.m. for discussion and inquires from conference participants.

Two monetary awards will be presented to outstanding research projects submitted by both a doctoral student, and a master or undergraduate student. Students are only eligible for one year after they have been awarded the degree under which they completed the research. The selected research projects will be presented orally at the CSC ACSM conference. The \$500 awards will be presented to the student upon subsequent registration to the national ACSM conference, with the intent of using the monetary award to support travel and lodging at the conference. A non-monetary/commemorative award will be presented to the best poster presentation for a student in any degree category. If a student wishes to be eligible for the monetary award, candidacy will need to be indicated on the abstract form, and a 3-4 page summary of the research project will need to be submitted. The research project summary must include an abstract, introduction/background, statement of purpose, methods/procedures, results, and conclusion/discussion.

April 15 is the last day to receive a discounted registration rate for the upcoming ACSM Annual Meeting to be held May 31-June 3 in Denver, Colorado.

Past-President's Message

I hope that this message finds all of you in good health. As we embark on 2006 I have been busy planning the upcoming Central States Meeting to be held at the Embassy Suites in Kansas City on October 19 and 20. The conference will keep the half-day Thursday, full day Friday format.

We have a nice line up of speakers, leading off with Dr. Raul Artal. Dr. Artal is the Chair of the Department of Obstetrics, Gynecology,

and Women's Health at St. Louis University Medical School. Dr. Artal has been involved with the writing of the Guidelines for Exercise and Post-partum since the American College of Obstetrics and Gynecology has issued a position on the issue. Dr. Pam Hinton and Dr. Debra Bembem will follow up Dr. Artal with presentations on women's health.

In addition, Dr. David Dzewaltowski will speak on Community Determinants of Physical Activity. His presentation will be followed up by Dr. Melissa Bopp who will speak on Promotion of Physical Activity Among the Elderly. These presentations follow up on some themes that the Active Aging Initiative is focusing on as discussed in the presentation of Dr. Wojtek Chodzko-Zajko at the 2005 conference.

We will also host a round table discussion of representatives of the Departments of Health of each of the states in the region. The discussion will center on efforts to prevent childhood obesity. Dr. Tom LaFontaine has agreed to moderate this session.

On Thursday morning, prior to the start of the Conference the Chapter will host a Life Fitness Academy Workshop. This workshop will start at 8 am and end at 12 pm. The speaker and topic for this workshop is to be determined. When we have determined the speaker and topic it will be publicized on the chapter web page. The chapter reaps a significant financial reward by hosting this workshop and it should be a great experience for participants.

One significant change will occur in the agenda for this year's meeting. The student poster session and the social will be moved to Thursday evening. This change should increase attendance at these events. Student oral research presentations will be on Thursday afternoon and if necessary on Friday afternoon as well. We will have more slots available for the student oral presentations, so encourage your students to submit their abstracts for the student awards.

The Administrative Council has determined to experiment with online balloting for the upcoming elections. Other chapters have used this system with great results.

So the 2006 meeting is taking shape. In the meantime I look forward to seeing you in Denver at the 2006 ACSM Conference.

News From The Student Representative

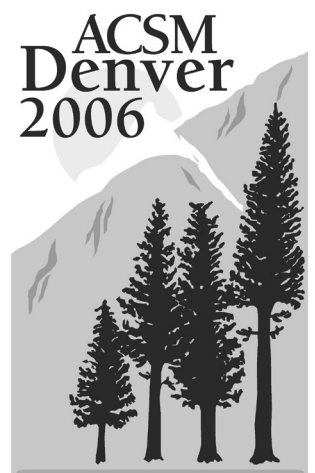
